*So if the Son sets you free, you will be free indeed.
John 8:36*

Free People

When I was younger and struggling with my identity, I was blessed to have people in my life who pointed out the good things in me that I didn't see. All I could see was that I was small, not the best in sports, was nerdy, and wasn't the most attractive guy in school. That is how I pictured myself in my mind. We tend to see the negative in ourselves, the failures, the ugly parts, and it can be really hard for us to see ourselves as the individuals that God created us to be. Even Scripture seems to struggle with this. In one place it says we're God's masterpieces, and in another place it says no one is good. In yet another place it says we're created a little less than God, but it also says none of us are worthy. The truth is that we are both; we are both God's beloved masterpieces and we are also broken people in need of God's healing. Thankfully, I had people in my life to help me see my God-given gifts and abilities. I was able to live into my calling and I was freed from my doubts.

We too, are called to see the gifts of others, peoples' God-given potential, and to speak hope into their lives. We tend to struggle with this as we judge people for their past mistakes. We imprison them with our expectations. We categorize groups of people and label them with negative attributes. We tend to create self-

fulfilling prophecies, as they then have to live with how they're treated. If you tell someone they're worthless long enough they'll certainly start to believe it. This is why Jesus said things like, "The poor will inherit the Kingdom of God". He knew that his words mattered and could heal.

So instead of imprisoning someone because of who they are today, free them. Free them so that they know they are beautiful, gifted, have a purpose, are forgiven, and have not been forgotten. Free them to see themselves as God's beloved. Free them to experience hope instead of believing that they are forever beholden to their past. When we look at another human being, we should hope to be able to see them with loving kindness. We should want what's best for them. We should be people who strive to enable them with the knowledge of God's love. I don't know who I'd be today without parents, teachers, youth pastors, and so many others who freed me with their words and their love. Who is someone in your life who you can free today?

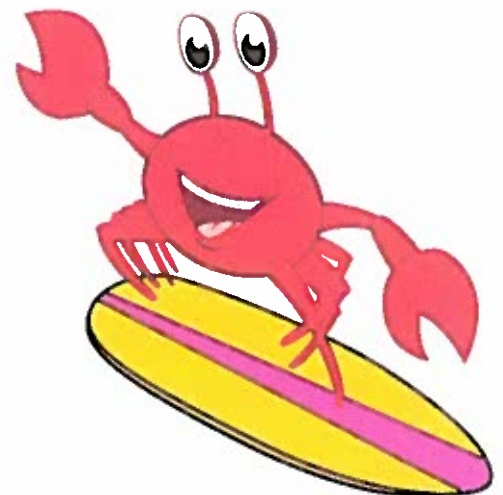

Hebrews 10:24-25: And let us consider each other carefully for the purpose of sparking love and good deeds. Don't stop meeting together with other believers, which some people have gotten into the habit of doing. Instead, encourage each other, especially as you see the day drawing near.

Unplug: Why we should Sometimes Leave our Devices in the Other Room

A UCLA study shows that young people who are constantly “plugged in” struggle more than is considered healthy to recognize social cues. In the study, young people “unplugged” for five days and they showed measurable improvements in understanding other people’s emotions and nonverbal cues. Constantly being connected to devices has shown in other studies to exhibit a lack of empathy and a decrease in the number of close friends. Jonathan McKee says that it’s not that smart phones or devices are bad, but rather we just need to be smarter than our smart phone. These devices are amazing in many ways when it comes to connecting us to the broader world, for education, and for many other utilities. However, they do become a hindrance in our connection with people.

One suggestion is having regular media/device fasts. Just as food fasting is a spiritual discipline that brings us closer to God, media/device fasts can have a similar effect. Create device-free zones and times during the day when your family comes together at the table to eat, or when card games are being played. Certain events such as family get-togethers or reunions can be device-free events.

Studies show that even if a phone is sitting on the table during a conversation, the device has a distracting effect on the individuals who are present. It is the temptation of the phone being in sight that causes our minds to wander. It would be a good practice to teach and model keeping devices out of site as much as possible, especially when social interaction may be occurring.

Utilize the Do-Not-Disturb functions on a phone so only family members can reach you when it’s activated. This is great during times when you still want to be able to reach loved ones in the event of an emergency but want to be “unplugged” from other distractions.

These are just a few of the many ways that might help your family to have healthy practices when it comes to our devices. It is important to remember that our faith as Christians is a community and social faith. It isn’t a faith that is lived out in a vacuum. If we want to be the best we can be at loving people just as Christ loves us, we need to promote healthy interaction with others. We need to be able to put our interest in others first, and we cannot do that if we are more concerned about that message that has come through on our phone than the conversation we are currently having. So unplug for a moment and allow your time with others to be more meaningful.

God knows our needs, yet it is still important for us to do our part in making sure we are obedient and prepare for the future. Yet, in all that preparation God has made it clear that we are to put Him first in all we do, especially in our giving. As we do that, He has promised that He would take care of our needs! October 9 – Generosity Sunday – opportunity to bring your pledge card to the altar to make your commitment of support to your church in 2017
October 13 – Finance Meeting
November 10- Finance meeting-will create 2017 budget **based on pledges received** –at this meeting if income (pledges) do not support proposed expenses, will have to look for cuts in operating/ministry expenses. If income exceeds requested expenses we can add to our ministry budget-would really love to have this problem!!!
December 1 – Finance Meeting-vote on final 2017 proposed budget to be presented to Leadership at their December 8 meeting.

Have you ever met an unhappy, generous person? Not likely. Have you ever regretted giving to ASP, Angel Tree, Community Emergency Shelter Project, Vacation Bible School, Peru Mission trips, the Operating Budget or a Capital Campaign? Again, not likely.

Mark 12:41-44 tells the story of the widow’s offering—two very small copper coins, worth only a few cents, everything she had. Jesus points out the widow who gave sacrificially. There were many others who gave generously from their riches. But Jesus told his disciples about the widow. THIS was sacrificial giving. What does it feel like to give sacrificially? I’ll bet it feels good. It shouts that there is more to life than having and attaining.

When you give, you are not just giving money to cover the expenses of Asbury. You help support the many missions and ministries that have eternal impact. Every penny given to this church is an investment. Your possessions will be lost in the end. But what the church does, changes lives.

The Finance Committee identified goals for 2016. Two of these goals were a 10% increase in the *NUMBER* of those pledging. To attain that goal, we would need 15 more new pledges. Could you be one of those? (I think we could attain more). Another goal was that 25% of those who pledged did so with Electronic Funds transfer, thus allowing consistent giving.

Come to the luncheon after World Communion service, watch the year in review slide show, and hear what is in store for 2017. READ THE GENEROSITY DEVOTIONAL. Consider the widow and sacrificial giving. 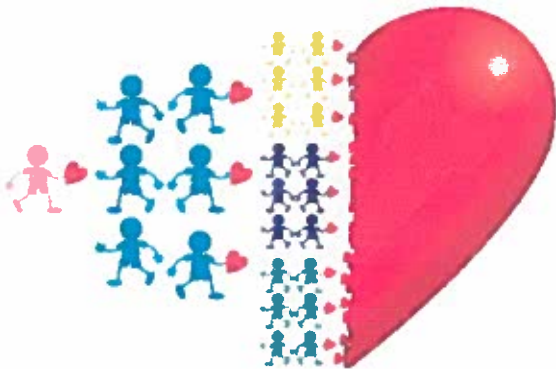
God's Kitchen

October 22 March 18 April 22 May 20

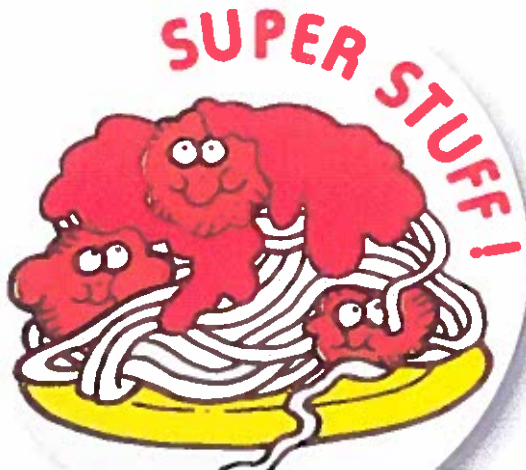
