PASTOR'S MESSAGE

What does it mean to be the church? To be a Christian community coming together in the name of Jesus Christ? Some people may believe that being in Christian community means coming to church when we are able, serving in the ministries of the church, using our gifts and talents for the work of the church, to be generous, and helping those in our congregation when they have a need. If you believe this you are absolutely right, but these things outside of the direction of the Holy Spirit living in us, are good and moral things that most community service organizations do as well. We, as Christians, are called to be so much more. If we are to be called Christians, that means that we bear the very image of Christ and we are called by God to be a peculiar people! James Bryan Smith, in his book, The Good and Beautiful Community: Following the Spirit, Extending Grace, Demonstrating Love, shares that we are called to be peculiar, "...in the best sense of the word. Peculiar, that is, to the world around us that does not live by the

teachings of Jesus." We are called to have our lives rooted in the kingdom of God which Smith says, "gives us the strength to live unselfishly, to strive for unity in the midst of diversity, to forgive even when it is not easy, to set our standards high, to live generously, to long to be



worshiping in the house of the Lord and to be witnesses of new life to a dying world." This type of behavior is counter cultural in today's world and can only be done by the presence of Christ in us! We cannot accomplish this in our own strength. "We need to be reminded and we need a community around us to help us remember who and whose we are and what that means for our daily lives." Our lives, when lived this way, fulfills the commandment to love God and to love our neighbor and that is a shocking way to live in today's world. I pray that, as the Christian community of Asbury United Methodist Church, we are peculiar, we are shocking, and that we continue to learn what it means to be image bearers of Christ as we live out our faith and our witness together.



Making Faith Stick for Young People

Kara Powell is an expert researcher on faith and young people. Her primary purpose is to find out how families can form healthy habits that will help young people to have a faith that will remain strong and be lifelong. Her research is especially important because we live in a culture and society where young people are more often than not losing their faith or turning away from religion after their high school years. She has 5 encouragements for every family to practice.

Kara says adults should share regularly with their children about their own faith journey. The best way to do this is organically as events or struggles are joys are celebrated, we can give testimony to how our faith has contributed to our journey, helped us through hard times, or added to our joy. Testimonies are powerful and give something tangible for young people to remember about why faith is meaningful and valuable. They will remember the faith stories you tell them that coincide with the meaningful moments of their lives.

Secondly, encourage young people to communicate their faith doubts and provide a safe place for them to do so. Doubts are normal, good, and are an opportunity for young people to further solidify their faith. Express your own doubts and struggles, share with your children those times in your live when your faith was challenged and the moments in which your faith was strengthened.

Thirdly, connect young people to several faithful and caring adults.

Intergenerational relationships are so vital because there are great cultural differences between our generations. Bridging those gaps with commonality and relationship ease the tension between our generations. And when young people have a team of adults who are there for them to create a web of support to catch them or encourage them or help them in their times of failure, they will be evermore likely to see how faithful people have enabled them to succeed.

Fourthly, encourage young people that their failures, sins, and mistakes are small in comparison to the profound grace of God. When young people fail, they oftentimes run away from God out of guilt and shame rather than running to the loving and forgiving God. We can model this loving and forgiving God to others in the ways in which we also respond with grace. Young people are oftentimes maladapted to failure and hardships, so modeling the grace of God in our homes may enable young people to experience the grace of God firsthand.

We are on track with our 2016 budget, although income did experience a dip during the summer. This is usually due to many of us away on vacations and traveling. Please remember we have two ways you can continue your consistent giving when you are not able to attend church. You can set up a fee free electronic transfer through our finance office or give online through our website - ways asburgueb org there is website – www.asburyweb.org- there is a 2.2% + .30 fee to the church when giving online. The Finance Chart for January - July shows us ending with a deficit of \$3,314. As much as we would like to be in the black, this deficit is not unusual for this time of year, in fact the vear to date deficit is much lower compared to the past few years. This is

Lastly, young people need help to plan for life after high school. Might you help a young person to research churches in their area? This can be done as you also help your child to plan their college schedule, finances, and other responsibilities. More than 40% of young people in college report that they have struggled to find a church and so they need help connecting with the spiritual resources available to them as they continue their journey in a new community.

These five practical ways stood out in Kara's research as essentials to enabling young people to have a faith that doesn't just fade into existence, but is a faith that is made real to them by the people who are closest to them. Sometimes our younger generations need help seeing God at work in the world around them, and what better way to do so than to fulfill the baptismal vow when we made the promise to nurture them in the faith?

Our mission trip was a great success, helping seven families in need by making their homes warmer, safer, and dryer. Asburians, celebrate the Christ inspired work of the youth and adults that you supported with your prayers, love, and financial gifts! They made a difference in the lives of others while growing in their own faith. During our trip, West Virginia experienced severe storms and flooding. Less than 100 miles northeast of where we were staying, the community of Rainelle, WV was completely devastated by the flooding. Inspired by their love for Christ and for the people of Appalachia, our ASP youth responded by collecting supplies and over \$500 in donations to send to the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) to help with relief efforts. Such is the impact of this ministry on youth and adults; it helps us to see beyond ourselves, and to love beyond our inner circles.

It is now time to start planning for the 2016-2017 ASP year. Our first organizational meeting will be Sunday, September 18 from 1-3 pm in Fellowship Hall.
