





PASTOR'S MESSAGE

Matthew 16:15

"And what about you? Who do you say that I am?"

In our Tuesday night study group, we have been studying John Ortberg's book entitled Who Is This Man?: The Unpredictable Impact of the Inescapable Jesus. John shares that, "Jesus is history's most familiar figure, yet he is the man no one knows. His impact on the world is immense and non-accidental. From the Dark Ages to Post-Modernity he is the Man who won't go away... His life and teaching simply drew people to follow him. He made history by starting in a humble place, in a spirit of love and acceptance, and allowing each person space to respond. His vision of life continues to haunt and challenge humanity. His influence has swept over history, bringing inspiration to what has happened in art. science, government, medicine, and education;



he has taught humans about dignity, compassion, forgiveness, and hope...and all of this is double-edged because his followers have wreaked so much havoc, often in his name." John also reminded us that although many times when someone dies their

immediately, Jesus' sphere of influence has increased exponentially since he died and is worldwide.

Our group has had to ask ourselves challenging and disturbing questions about our own faith and who we believe Jesus is. We have asked ourselves questions such as what we seek from Jesus, do we see all people through the eyes of our faith and if we are willing to rearrange our lives in ways that we can know Jesus more deeply? We have also looked at the radical teachings of Jesus and challenged ourselves to begin to practice one or more of those teachings. We have been stretched and grown in our faith through this study and have encouraged and supported one another. We must be intentional about growing in our faith or we risk becoming complacent in the way we live and respond to situations and to others.

Religious research often shares that more is learned and lived in circles than in pews. I believe we need both, times of corporate worship and small groups to grow our faith. If you are interested in becoming part of a small group or if you are interested in starting a small group please contact me or the church office.



Acts 2:42-47

The believers devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching, to the community, to their shared meals, and to their prayers. A sense of awe came over everyone. God performed many wonders and signs through the apostles. All the believers were united and shared everything. They would sell pieces of property and possessions and distribute the proceeds to everyone who needed them. Every day, they met together in the temple and ate in their homes. They shared food with gladness and simplicity. They praised God and demonstrated God's goodness to everyone. The Lord added daily to the community those who were being saved.

Longing for Belonging

Kara Powell, a leading researcher for youth in the church, says that young people want a church that is *warm* not *cool*. By this, she means that youth want warmth and connection; they want to build meaningful relationships as they also connect with God. Words like *welcoming*, accepting, authenticity, hospitality, belonging, and caring are all words that are attractive to a young person in the context of the church. Kara says that across the board in statistical analyses, these attributes of *warmth* outweigh any kind of program or ministry. Note that warmth doesn't mean *nice*. It means that the church is like a real and authentic family. No amount of flashy music, enhanced worship spaces, or *cool* ministries will ever match the desire of young people for the church to be a family.

I think one of the most valuable things about our church when it comes to opportunities for young people, is the small groups that are available to them. Youth Group, puppets, ASP, bell and voice choirs all provide a space for young people to work and grow together. They have the opportunity in those ministries to find purpose and meaning as they grow close to adult volunteers and one another. The small groups function in many ways like a family, as they have to find ways to work together for a common purpose despite differences among them. When a young person can *belong* despite their unique personhood, they can better live into their calling as the person God created them to be.

I believe this is a major part of our vision as a church: to foster a community where many small groups of people are working together to be Christ to the world. I believe the best way to think of these small groups is to consider them small families or little churches within the big church. We all long for such community, but it is especially valuable to young people today who are growing up in a culture of individualism and materialism. It is a culture that does not promote such family connection, belonging and relationships. So let us be intentional about creating space for young people to belong here at Asbury. Support youth by volunteering to simply be a presence, a safe sanctuary adult, or a helper in one of our several youth ministries.

While we are in the midst of our Generosity/Stewardship Campaign, I wanted to be sure to let you know that we are forever grateful for the faithful generosity of the congregation of Asbury Church.

What does "Generosity and Stewardship" mean? A look at the dictionary says: generosity - readiness or liberality in giving; stewardship- one who manages another's property, finances, or other affairs. Eric has been our Associate Pastor at Asbury since July 1, 2013. He has supported and participated in many areas of our church including Worship Ministries-preaching and teaching; Supporting the Care Ministries; Leading New Member Classes; re-starting the United Methodist Men's group; Youth events including: Confirmation, UMYF, Acolytes & Crucifers, Youth Rally, ASP, etc.

He will be leaving Asbury June 30, 2017. We are thankful to have played a part in his ministry and look forward to the next seven months of his continued leadership. We wish only the best for Eric and have been blessed to share this part of our journeys together with him.

Benita shared with SPRC a new vision for the staff. SPRC took some time to pray and discern this new direction. The SPRC approved, and received the approval of the Leadership Team, to take the Associate Pastor's position and create two new positions for the church staff – the Associate Pastor position will become...

(1) Director of Youth and Family Ministries

Ministers primarily to grades 6-12 including involvement of the families of the youth in the life of the congregation; the youth ministry program and all that encompasses.

(2) Director of Adult Spiritual Formation and Membership
Responsible for developing, educating and implementation of small group ministries at
Asbury. Follow-up with all visitors and connecting people with groups and ministries
available at Asbury.

SPRC will work on creating a formal job description for both positions and will work on hiring the new positions that will begin July 1, 2017. Please join us in praying not only for Eric's new appointment, but also for the new positions for our church staff.

"Cozy Cot"- 2 FLAT twin sheets (NO fitted), blanket, pillow, pillowcase (tie all this together with string).



- 6) Asbury is equally blessed with many faith-filled and talented people who have stepped up to volunteer in the many roles needed to lead and support the ministries of Asbury.


