

Of all the great traditions of our church around Easter, one of my favorites is the flowering cross that springs to life after worship on the brick patio of Asbury. I think this is one of the greatest representations of resurrection that I have ever seen. The cross, an instrument of death, is transformed over the course of the morning, into a beautiful display of colorful flowers. Death is turned to new life. Christ is alive.

The flowering cross is a celebration of the new life that Jesus brings us through his own resurrection. Jesus was not willing to let death have the last word. On the third day, he rose so that all of us may have new life. New opportunities to be more than we are now. New opportunities to let something in us die so that something new and better can replace it. New opportunities to go deeper with a God who loved us so much that death couldn't separate us from that love.

Where is new life infusing your old life? What is dying to allow this new life to flourish? This April as we enter into the Easter season, let's seek new life in our attitudes, behaviors, habits, and relationships. Let us seek the face of the resurrected One who will never abandon us.

Easter says to us that despite everything to the contrary, his will for us will prevail, love will prevail over hate, justice over injustice and oppression, peace over exploitation and bitterness. -Archbishop Desmond Tutu

Did you know that there's a tax-efficient way of meeting your pledge? It allows you to do so by donating appreciated shares of stocks or mutual funds, instead of using cash from your checking or savings accounts. Here are the details:

Donating shares of stock or a mutual fund offers two attractive benefits:

- 1) By donating shares of stock or mutual funds which have increased in value, you can realize the value of your gains without having to pay federal or state taxes.
- 2) You leave your checking or savings accounts untouched by drawing from your invested assets instead.

Here's how it works:

- 1) First, consider your different <u>taxable</u> accounts to select part or all of a specific asset that has increased in value. This could include shares of a company held in a brokerage account, or shares of a mutual fund held by financial firms like Fidelity or T. Rowe Price.
- 2) Once you've selected which asset you want to donate, contact the broker or investment firm to request the form needed to make a transfer to a church. For example, if you use Charles Schwab, ask for a "Charitable Gift Transfer" form. If you use T. Rowe Price, ask for a "Gift to Nonprofit Organization" form (these forms can also be found on their websites). Depending upon the financial institution, the form might be named in different ways.
- 3) When you have the correct form, contact Janice Ilczuk (the church's Finance Director) at 410-749-2131 to express your desire to donate using this gifting method. She will provide the church account information that needs to be entered onto your transfer form.
- 4) When you're ready to submit your form to the church, describe the asset you wish to donate (e.g. 100 shares of XYZ Company, or 27 shares of T. Rowe Price Equity Income Fund) and write it on your form. Finally, calculate the number of shares needed to meet your donation's dollar amount. You need to know the most recent cost-per-share of the stock or mutual fund to do the math.
- 5) Complete the form and submit it to Janice Ilczuk.

Rules and Reminders-

- 1) Your tax-savings benefit occurs when you transfer shares which have gone up in value. When you donate an appreciated asset to a non-profit, you avoid the federal and state capital gains taxes which you would otherwise pay from the sale.
- 2) Know that you can't get "double benefits" from this method. <u>You cannot</u> later claim the transfer as a charitable donation on your tax form for the year. When the assets transfer, that's when you realize the tax savings.
- 3) This process applies to *taxable* accounts. Donating from a Roth IRA defeats the tax-saving benefit from this process. With a traditional IRA, you can use this method as part of your Required Minimum Distributions (RMDs) if you are age 73 or older.
- 4) You can use this tax-saving method at any time to make special, one-time gifts.


This worship service will include scripture, meditations, and times of reflection. All are invited and welcome to attend.

*Good Friday Worship: April 7^{th} at 7pm at <u>Bethesda UMC</u>. All are invited and welcome to worship.




On April 9th, we can revel in celebrating that Christ is risen—he is risen indeed! Alleluia! Christmas and Easter are two of the most joyous times in the church year as we celebrate, respectively, the incarnation—the coming of Christ, and the resurrection—the power of love and non-violence over death. Christ is risen - He is risen indeed! We joyfully recite these words every Easter. But, what does the resurrection truly mean? What does Christ's resurrection mean to you in your daily life? What does that look like? I encourage you to take some time in

silence and solitude to journal, pray, and reflect on these things. Or, find someone you trust to verbally process these ideas.



The Evangelical Tradition encompasses much more than simply converting people. The evangel – the "good news" – is God's great message to humanity: that all can be redeemed and restored to its intended design. This is the message embodied in Jesus himself, rooted in the word of God, and ultimately expressed through the lives of those who follow Christ. It is a living tale of grace spoken in and through word and action.





Join the discussion about the Evangelical Stream of the Church on Thursday April 27th at 7pm in the library (NOT the 3rd Thursday this month—sorry about that!). All are welcome to attend. Our spiritual practice of the month, born out of the Evangelical tradition, is scripture memorization. Enjoy this italicized excerpt from Renovare Institute, adapted from author Jan Johnson:

"When we look at how Jesus behaved—so others-centered and compassionate, speaking truth firmly yet in love—we want to be like him. But first we need to have the internal life that Jesus had that caused that behavior. We need to think the way Christ thought. A key to Christlikeness is developing the "mind of Christ." For who has known the mind of the Lord that he may instruct him? But we have the mind of Christ" (1 Cor 2:16).

A great help in developing the mind of Christ and restoring the soul is learning Scripture by heart. "If I had to choose between all the disciplines of the spiritual life," Dallas Willard writes, "I would choose Bible memorization, because it is a fundamental way of filling our minds with what it needs."

Keys to Shaping our Memory

Repetition: The more you've heard a passage, the easier it is to learn by heart. For this reason, 1 Corinthians 13 can be a little easier to memorize after having it heard so many times at weddings.

Concentration (Focus): Wrapping one's mind around a passage is imperative. This intensity is best motivated by a desire to absorb the ideas in the passage. You may wish to print it out and color code certain words or draw diagrams that illustrate its flow.

Understanding: Studying a commentary to comprehend the meaning of a passage in its original context or how it connects with other passages increases our grasp of its meaning. You may wish to look up specific words also for their meaning. It's much easier to memorize a passage when you've looked at it repetitively for several days or weeks, concentrated on it, and worked to understand it.

Passages Instead of Single Verses: While single verses here and there might be helpful, it's better to memorize larger chunks of Scripture. The ideas presented in Scripture have a flow to them and it's easier to understand that flow when in larger sections. You see how ideas connect.

Passages Often Recommended: Colossians 3:1-17; Romans 8:1-17; 1 Corinthians 13; all or parts of Philippians 2-4; all or parts of the Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 5-7); John 15:1-17; Psalm 23, 27, 91 and 103."

Scripture

Luke 24: 1-6 NIV

On the first day of the week, very early in the morning, the women took the spices they had prepared and went to the tomb. They found the stone rolled away from the tomb, but when they entered, they did not find the body of the Lord Jesus. While they were wondering about this, suddenly two men in clothes that gleamed like lightning stood beside them. In their fright the women bowed down with their faces to the ground, but the men said to them, "Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here; he has risen!

Devotional

The dictionary tells us that a surprise is 'an unexpected or astonishing event, fact, or thing'. Do you enjoy being surprised? Some people do, and some people don't. Surprises can be fun, like receiving an unexpected gift or finding something special that you lost. But surprises can also be scary, like when someone jumps out and startles you on purpose, or when you don't do as well on a test as you expected. Pastor deVega describes LENT as: "an invitation to engage life's uncertainties not ignore them." We will look deeply into our hearts as we explore the death and Resurrection of Jesus Christ our Lord in all four Gospels!



Come join us in the **Open Hearts, Open Minds** adult class. **ALL** are welcome to attend this Sunday School class held in the Mackey room. We convene between 9:45-10:00 with joys and concerns before beginning the lesson. Our collection each Sunday is used to support 4 local and 1 international charities: ASP, Habitat for Humanity, the Village of Hope, Afghan Refugee project, and Covenant Mercies, where we have supported the same Ugandan child for 7 years.

For this spring, we have chosen the curriculum <u>Saving Jesus</u>, <u>Redux</u>, from the Living the Questions Project. This series is an exploration of a credible Jesus for the 21^{st} Century. The premise underlying the conversations asks the question: "Ever feel like Jesus has been kidnapped by the Christian right or discarded by the secular left"? There are 12 conversations beginning with Jesus through the Ages to the wrap up of Why Jesus is Worth Saving.
