

February is not my favorite month. First, it's winter. It's cold. It's dreary. It gets dark really early. Even Punxsutawney Phil, that landmark of modern, scientific weather prediction, doesn't stay out of his borrow any longer than it takes to see if his shadow is there or not. (If he is not a big a fan of the weather at this time of year, why should I be?) Secondly, as a thinking, very practical, deeply analytical type of person, I am what most people might call "romantically challenged." My brain doesn't seem to be wired to think romantically or of romantic things. It's as if romance were some bizarre foreign language that I don't speak at all. ¿Sprechen sie d'amour? The excuse that I have always used in the past is that I don't know what romance is, but this is pretty flimsy considering the number of movies

dealing with romance, both dramatic and comedic, that exist in the vast libraries of Hollywood. Somewhere I had to have watched at least one that gave me some kind of a clue. Unfortunately, no matter how hard I try to exemplify Cary Grant on Valentine's Day, I usually end up smelling like Pepé LePew. C'est la vie.

The good news is that romance is not love, and love is not romance. Romance is about piquing an interest. It's based on emotion and feeling. Love is something all together different. Love is a state of being, and no one says this better than Paul in 1st Corinthians chapter 13. One of the greatest experiences in my life has been the continual process of falling in love with Sarah, my wife. I constantly desire to get close to her soul and persistently seek to know her heart, at least most of the time. The closest thing that I can compare it to, in order to better describe this condition, is being a faithful Christian. Being a faithful Christian is about continually seeking to know the heart of God. Persistently trying to discern what is God's will for us and then trying to live that out. One of the great things about true love is that it waits on us. Go ahead and give it a try. Invite God into your heart and see what happens in your life.

My prayer for you today is that the Holy Spirit touches you in a new and powerful way. I hope that you feel God and experience the presence of the Father, Son, and Spirit, right now wherever you happen to be reading this, and that you will, in turn, seek to know the heart of God.

FINANCE - 2022 GIVING/FINANCIALS

As we close another year, I want to take this opportunity to first say "thank you" for your faithful giving to Asbury Church. Without a doubt, these past few years have been some of the most challenging for all of us. The church is no different when it comes to facing challenges, yet the same God who has been with

us before is still on the throne!

As you review the 2022 financial chart, you will see that we ended the year with an actual deficit of \$32,107. We had approved an unbalanced budget forecasting a deficit of \$48,981. As we worked all year to keep our expenses down or at least within budget, our income just did not keep up with costs. Our beginning of the year operating reserve of \$204,313 was used to cover the deficit, thus resulting in a carryover reserve of \$172,206 to 2023.

Note: An operating reserve is an unrestricted fund balance set aside to stabilize a nonprofit's finances by providing a cushion against unexpected events, losses of income, and large unbudgeted expenses. When an unexpected financial shortfall occurs, having cash reserves to tap can help a nonprofit sustain itself and continue to meet its mission even in very tough times.

FINANCE - 2023 BUDGET

This year's operating budget is \$806,500- see finance chart for details. The Finance Committee is anticipating a deficit this year. We have added a new line in the income section of the budget to show usage of the operating reserve, instead of approving an unbalanced budget as in prior years. We start the year with an operating reserve of \$172,206-as mentioned in the 2022 Giving/Financials article. We meet monthly to review our financial status and will keep you, our members and friends, updated through the Asburian, bulletin and email blasts.

Ways you can help support this year's budget:

- Pray over your giving to support your church-for ministries and operations.
- Fulfill your 2023 pledge commitment.
- If you have not made a pledge commitment for 2023, it is not too late- pledge cards are in both welcome centers and you can email janice@asburyweb.org to let her know of your giving intentions.
- Help the church conserve utility costs: turn lights out, minisplits, a/c units off when leaving rooms, turn office equipment off when not in use, notify the church office if you are cancelling meetings so that heat or a/c can be cancelled, etc.

With your help and support, we look forward to watching Asbury's ministries thrive in 2023.

ASBURY TOOL KIT



The biggest tool kit Asbury has is the Bible. From the Bible, God gives us the tools we need to become followers of Christ, His Son, and our Redeemer. Some of those tools are faith, hope, charity, love, and mercy. As we go about our day learning how to use these tools in the service of our Christian faith, God sharpens our tools to ever increase our productivity in his service.

One of the ways our productivity works is through missions. Asbury Service Project (ASP) is an example of the application of the tools from the Bible as well as tools from the hardware store.

Another example is Asbury's maintenance staff member, Bob Love. Bob is Asbury's Mr. Fixit. He oversees a large and complex building that requires upkeep and material support for the staff and congregation, with limited resources. One area where Bob can use our help is the tools he occasionally needs to accomplish this mission. It can be expensive to purchase all the tools needed, so a plan has been formed to make more tools available to Bob.

Asbury is asking anyone who has tools and would be comfortable loaning them to Bob to please email him at bob@asburyweb.org with a list of their tools. This will allow Bob to have a menu of tools he can borrow on request. Bob will keep a list of the tools with the owner's name, phone number and email address. As Bob may request and receive tools from the lists, he will log the loaned tool(s) with the date, time, and date the owner has requested the return of the tool(s).


With all our heart, we focus on our identity as children of God.

ADULT SPIRITUAL FORMATION AND MEMBERSHIP

Dear faith family,

What does it look like to "do justice"? To "love kindness"? To "walk humbly with God"? These are exactly what the prophet Micah tells us that God requires of God's children:


[God] has told you, O mortal, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you but to **do justice**, and to **love kindness**, and to **walk humbly with your God**? Micah 6:8 ESV

Our spiritual practice of the month runs in the Social Justice tradition of the Church. *Our aim is to become more like Jesus in our stream of concentration*. (Come to delve deeper into this tradition and discuss the Social Justice chapter in Richard Foster's book *Streams of Living Water* on the Third Thursday of February at 7pm).

"The Social Justice Tradition is constantly calling us to a right ordering of society—right relationships and right living. It envisions the social order as it was meant to be.....The call of social justice is to a life that, because it functions well, makes peaceful social evolution possible." The Social Justice Tradition enhances our doctrine of the Church, helping to make our faith real" as we live it out.

The ultimate foundation of our faith in a nutshell is "love God and love your neighbor as yourself." Part of loving one's neighbor as oneself is to want for neighbors what we want for ourselves and our loved ones. Richard Foster shares that there are three great arenas to consider:

1. <u>The personal arena:</u> "This is critical, for we cannot work for justice and live injustice; we cannot work or peace and live war; we cannot work for racial reconciliation and live bigotry. We stand against all forms of pride, envy, anger, sloth, greed, gluttony, and lust within ourselves for these destroy the good we would do in the world." <u>Major tools</u>: Prayer/action (striving for virtue, discernment of where God calls us to act.)



2. The social arena: "This begins on the level of interpersonal relationships: marriages and families and friends and neighbors and work associates and all those who curse us and spitefully use us...we live in peace with all people. This is the work of healing and reconciliation, of compassion and shalom." This includes the larger social context of our community—school boards and community clubs and civic organizations and city commissions, etc. Our mandate is to "bring love and joy and peace and patience and kindness and generosity and faithfulness and gentleness and self-control" into these places of our influence.

"We engage in the work of reconciliation and healing, but we do more too. We look for those who are excluded or neglected because of their social status, or their race, or their background, or their gender, or their age, or any number of other things. And we lobby for their acceptance and welcome and embrace

into the social network. We also look to see if there are social networks that are destructive to human life—networks that manipulate and control, networks that exclude and reject. These are not difficult to identify if we have eyes to see. Then, depending on the situation, our task is to either work for their transformation or defeat."


*This means paying attention and acting with compassion even if a particular discrimination, exclusion, or harmful act is being done to us! Remember: to love our neighbors, we want for them what we want for ourselves and loved ones.



<u>Major tools</u>: The Christian Community/action—"an alternative way of living that shows forth social life as it is meant to be lived. Communities of love and acceptance. Fellowships of freedom and liberation. Centers of hope and vision. Societies of nurture and accountability. Little pockets of life and light so stunning that a watching world will declare, "see how they love one another!"

3. The arena of institutional structures: "When Jesus cleansed the temple he was defeating an institutional structure that had become destructive...Our task is to envision and work to realize a society where it is easier to do good and harder to do evil; a society with institutions and laws and public policies that provide justice for all and enhanced life for all. Where structures perpetuate poverty, we work to change them. Where structures dehumanize, we work to make them more responsive to human need. In addition, we welcome and work for all institutions that enhance art and beauty.

Major Tools: Prophetic Witness/action (in many cases this can be known as speaking truth to power)—"we are the conscience to the various expressions of institutional life, most particularly the state. We comment the state when it provides justice for all, and we bring prophetic critique when it fails...." When we are called, "we must act in a manner consistent with the commandments to love God and love neighbor; we must conduct peaceful, nonviolent, prophetic protest."



There is SO much more complexity than can be fit here, so please come to our discussion on Feb. 16th at 7pm to chat and explore. Stay tuned for what our monthly spiritual practice will be!

ALTAR FLOWERS ARRANGEMENTS



We have had wonderful feedback about the altar flowers ministry! Altar flowers can be donated as a way to honor and remember loved ones, special anniversaries/events. We will note who you are honoring in the bulletin.

Following is our altar flowers program:

In the SANCTUARY for EMA and Festive services:

1.Up to 3 (traditional 3-point only) altar arrangements can be donated weekly - one on each side of high altar, and one on the

floor in front of the low altar. The cost is currently \$55 per arrangement.

- 2. If there is a week where only one arrangement is donated, it will go in front of the low altar, and the white silk arrangements will be used on the high altar.
- 3. Kitty's will create a "seasonal mix" arrangement with colors to compliment the paraments, or to use fresh flowers they have readily available.
- 4. Please note that you are not able to choose a specific color palette for the high altar arrangements unless you are donating both this ensures that the high altar arrangements match, and will look cohesive.
- 5. A single rose in a bud vase can be placed on the high altar. The cost is currently \$10. Limit one each week.
- 6. You may take your arrangement or bud vase with you AFTER the 11:00 am Festive service concludes.

In the Fellowship Hall for CAYR service:

- 1. One floral arrangement traditional 3-point only can be donated weekly to be placed on the altar.
- 2. Kitty's will create a "seasonal mix" arrangement with colors to compliment the altar, or to use fresh flowers they have readily available.
- 3. A single rose in a bud vase can be placed on the altar. The cost is currently \$10. Limit one each week.
- 4. You may take your arrangement or bud vase with you AFTER the 8:45 am CAYR service concludes.
- In order to get the special pricing that Kitty's extends to Asbury's members for altar arrangements, the type of flowers used in the arrangement are their choice carnations, chrysanthemums, gladiolus, etc. Flowers that are typically more expensive, such as roses, lilies, hydrangea, etc. are NOT available at the special price.
- You will be billed directly from Kitty's.
- If you do not wish to take the flowers you donated, we are happy to use them elsewhere! We will make several smaller arrangements from the leftover flowers and the Visitation Team will give then to our members during home, hospital or nursing home visits. If you have glass vases that you do not use and would like to donate for this cause, please place them in the donation box CURRENTLY LOCATED IN THE ADMIN HALLWAY CUBBIES until the renovations are complete. Afterwards, the box will be located in the cubbies outside of the Sacristy.
