As we prepare for our yearly ASP adventure in June and subsequent VBS adventure in July, I just wanted to share a story of God at work in the world. This story comes from the VBS program of a previous church that I served, Hope UMC in Dover.

During VBS at Hope in 2007, Sarah and another volunteer ran the recreation part of the program, where they and the kids would play games in the parking lot behind the church. To keep the kids safe we had put up orange traffic cones to mark off the boundary of the play area, and Sarah had a strict rule for the kids to stay inside of these boundaries. Sarah and her helper took great pains to insure the kids understood how important this rule was. They repeated it several times. Later that first night when one of the teachers, as part of her lesson, asked the kids what God had instructed Abraham to do in Genesis, instead of answering moving from Ur of the Chaldeans to the Promised Land, the three year old in questions, Lily, quickly blurted out, "Don't go past the orange cones!!" It still makes me laugh to think about it.

After some reflection, however, I asked myself, what would have happened if Abraham had decided not to listen and stayed inside "the orange cones?" What if he hadn't extended himself and reached out as God had asked him to? One of the things that I am in constant danger of is blocking off my own very comfortable space with big "orange cones" and not seeking to reach out to people who do not have Jesus in their lives. It's so much easier to NOT extend one's self. But Jesus is pretty clear about the commandment to spread the Gospel to the entire world. Loving your neighbor as yourself is the ultimate form of extending your boundaries because it forces you to walk "a mile in their shoes." You begin to see life from a point of view besides your own and this can be very uncomfortable at times. ASP has this kind of effect on the youth and adults that participate in the mission trip. We all need to think about the "orange cones" in our lives and which ones we need to heed and which ones we need to move.

God is going to use us this summer to teach kids about Jesus through VBS, and that God is going to use us this summer to make homes warmer, safer, and drier in Appalachia. We are going to move some cones and draw the circle even wider. Don't you want to be a part of it??

Summertime is nearly upon us once again. This can be such a wonderfully refreshing time for us as we go our separate ways for various vacations, cookouts, family reunions and the list goes on. Without a doubt, we all need breaks from our daily routines and we pray that each of you are able to enjoy some down time over the summer. We would like to gently remind you that if you are able to take a break and need to miss some services here at Asbury, the work of our ministry continues throughout the summer months. Often this is a time of "ramping" up for ministries taking place in the fall and winter months ahead.

As you review the finance chart, you will see we ended April with a net of \$23,823. We did experience a loss of \$4,851 for the month. While it is only 4 months into the year, our Finance Committee is always crunching numbers to see where we can save expenses in order that we can maximize funds supporting our ministries. We agree it is more exciting to pay for a ministry expense than the electric or gas bill - but utilities have to be paid in order for us to worship and enjoy our ministries in the building. This is why continued giving is so important –even though many of us are away over the next few months, the utilities/expenses continue each month. In order to help us not to have to play "catch up" with our budget in the fall please pray about your donations as you plan for your summer down time.

## CATALYST INITIATIVE



Over the past year Asbury has been a part of the Catalyst Initiative with the Peninsula-Delaware and Baltimore-Washington Annual Conferences. The program is designed to help churches listen deeply to the needs of the community and then find ways to build ministries and community partnerships to meet those needs.

Asbury's team of George Whitehead, Dave Harris, Amy Cropper, Mary Beth Gicking, and Pastor Tom met with community leaders, worked through the program, and were even able to design an experiment that we ran on Friday, May

5, at the Mental Health Awareness Downtown Family Night sponsored by the Wicomico County Public Schools, Wicomico Partnership (Local Management Board), and the City of Salisbury.

We learned that we have a long way to go in terms of mental health awareness here on the Eastern Shore, but also learned that parents know where they can go for mental health services, but had no idea where to go to obtain mental health services for their children. This is a conversation that we need to continue.

Now that we are done with the classroom part of the Catalyst work that we feel called to, it's time to invite the entire church to help us build awareness about mental health in our community and in our families. On August 6, the focus of our time in worship will be mental health. When we get into the fall, with the help of the Leadership Team, we will be having a family dinner to raise awareness around mental health and various service here in Wicomico County to help with mental health.




The Trustees continue the hard work of upgrading our facilities. This year's summer projects include more renovations, removing asbestos in the building, and upgrading flooring/ceiling/lighting. After ACDC closes for the summer, we will start the asbestos removal in classrooms #124 & #126. We will start this project on June 13. This renovation should not cause much disruption in the day to day operations, as it will be confined to that area in the Education Wing.

Starting July 17, we will begin the major upgrade to ceilings, lights and flooring of the Administrative hallways on the first floor. We will be closing this hallway, which includes access to the staff offices, Library, Fox Room and Mackey Room. This hallway will be closed for asbestos removal for approximately two weeks, and then will be under construction for several more weeks-similar to last year's renovation of the Memorial/Disciple Garden hallway. We want to make sure that you are aware that there will be disruptions to the summer activities here at Asbury. We can't wait for this project to be done so that we can see these upgrades in place.

We will provide further information as it gets closer as to which doors/areas will be closed at certain times for both of these projects. Any questions, ask Janice or Pastor Tom.




#### ADULT SPIRITUAL FORMATION AND MEMBERSHIP Rev. Kristen Wall-Love, Director of Spiritual Formation and Membership

Dear faith family,

June is the final month in our 6-month series of discussion and spiritual practices revolving around Richard Foster's book *Streams of Living Water*. This book explores the six streams or traditions of the Church—all of which are needed. So far we have spent time in the following streams: holiness, social justice, charismatic, evangelical, incarnational, and for our final tradition, we will embrace the contemplative stream.

A way to think of the contemplative stream is a "prayer-filled life of <u>loving</u> <u>attention to God</u>." In all things. Everyday things. Our comings and goings, our interactions with others, nature, work, rest, play—all of it. Last year there was a book study on Roger Owens' book *The Way of Prayerful Living: Everyday Contemplative*. Owens states that "To live contemplatively means simply to approach [everyday] life with <u>op</u>enness (acceptance of or receptiveness to change or new ideas), <u>a</u>vailability (the state of being otherwise unoccupied), and <u>r</u>esponsiveness (the quality of reacting quickly and positively) to God…" I commend this book to you! It is an excellent unpacking of this tradition. In fact, he uses this acronym (OAR) as a method to "move us closer to God." I will give you the highlights here:

According to the author, seven main characteristics are found in the contemplative life (not exhaustive):



Longing: this involves teasing out our longing for God from other longings, because we often confuse them and try to satisfy our souls with things that only God can quench in us. Take notice of your life— Note places of dissatisfaction and frustration, of wanting more, of restlessness. Places where hope and joy are beginning to bloom..." "Noticing a longing for God might require hitting the pause button on the breathless need to satisfy every urge or escape every unsatisfying inner experience. We must take time to be with these urges and wants before they will take the time to tell us what they are really about...."

<u>Attention</u>: God always has our full attention. When is the last time you gave your full attention to God? Others?

<u>Patience:</u> Willingness vs willfulness. ~ "If I were to live a life open and responsive to God, I would need to learn to face reality as it is rather than as I want it to be. That would mean approaching my life with patience—the patience required to live not in control. "When we attend well to our lives...when we slow to a pace that allows us to notice the particulars of our lives, and we can only attend to God in our spiritual practice if we refuse the temptation to hurry."

<u>Playfulness:</u> "God simply enjoys us for who we are, not what we can do for God. Rediscovering prayer and life as a kind of play can help us enter--and enjoy--this liberating truth."

Vulnerability: "...there is a risk in opening our lives to this God who transforms us. Transforming sometimes means seeing things about ourselves we didn't want to see and changing in ways we never

would have imagined." Owens claims there are 3 prominent defense strategies against the world's attempt to change us and love's painful consequences: religiosity, (doing the right things), expertise (knowing the right things), and success in all the right things. Which one(s) do you find yourself in the most? "These strategies protect the true authentic self that fears it is not resilient enough to withstand the wounding world and actions of the people whose acceptance it so desires."

<u>Nonjudgment</u>: "...we judge, compare, and condemn." "Again and again, Jesus, by his words and his deeds -erased the dividing lines of judgment set up by religion and culture and welcomed the judged into fellowship with himself and, through himself, with God... Each person we encounter is a word from the Lord,...but our habits of judgment pull the blinds down on our windows of perception...we have prevented ourselves from seeing them as a revelation of divine love. Note: Approaching life with a posture of nonjudgment doesn't mean accepting evil when we see it. Injustice of all kinds need to be called out: systemic racism, economic equality, environmental degradation, and others.



I will be sharing more wisdom from this book in the emails during the month—sign up on your connection card for the spiritual practice of the month—which is "loving attention toward God." When I attended the Renovare Institute, this is one of the ways we were invited to practice swimming in the contemplative stream: Go to a quiet spot and reflect on how satisfied you are with your life, with how you are spending your time, and with where it seems to be headed. Ask yourself if your life seems hurried and out of control. Then consider whether your days contain enough margins sufficient buffers of time for rest, play and reflection. Ask God to show you where to find more space for enjoying a conversational relationship with the

Trinity and with other people. In other words, take some quiet time with God and conduct an inventory of your life, relationships, and soul.



Join us in chatting about the contemplative tradition on Thursday June 15<sup>th</sup> at 7pm in the library. It's ok if you haven't read the *Streams of Living Water* book—come and join in. All are welcome! You can RSVP on your connection card—easy peasy!

The spiritual practice for July (and August) is RETREAT. Many times, summer schedules are a bit more flexible, so it is a good time to go on retreat. I am challenging you to **begin making plans right now and set aside some time this summer to go on a retreat**. If you want help, I am here for you. 
## AFGHAN FAMILY UPDATE

On May 21st, Asbury hosted a covered dish luncheon with our Afghan family and our friends from the Delmarva Muslim Community. Food tables were full of each family's favorite dishes including special South Asian treats, and there were plenty of desserts! It was another chance to meet the family and visit with our neighbors from the Delmarva Muslim Community. We saw pictures of beautiful scenery that are likely very different than images you've seen in the news. Azim talked about the four distinct regions of his homeland, languages, tribes, and historical/ geo-graphical significance. One moment was very moving – Azim brought his soon to be 10 year old daughter, Asenat, to the front and explained that every day he is thankful for her opportunities in the United States. He contrasted that with education and advancement the situation for his mother, who is a widow with no males at home, so she is unable to leave her home as Afghan women are not allowed out unaccompanied.

Family resettlement continues. Azim, who has full time employment in dining services at SU, is driving and took his first independent big trip "across the bridge"! Tahmina has just finished her second English class at SU. Wahed, age 12, is preparing for his transfer to JMB Middle School. Farhan turned 3 in May and had both a birthday party at home and a breakfast outing with his brother and sister to IHOP for American waffles. Asenat is doing well in third grade at Pinehurst, and was named "student of the month." Immigration legal filings are underway. Hamid, Tahmina's brother, has decided to move to California to be with other single Afghan men, as well as their brother.



# ALTAR FLOWERS ARRANGEMENTS



We have had wonderful feedback about the altar flowers ministry! Altar flowers can be donated as a way to honor and remember loved ones, special anniversaries/events. We will note who you are honoring in the bulletin.

Following is our altar flowers program:

## In the SANCTUARY for EMA and Festive services:

1.Up to 3 (traditional 3-point only) altar arrangements can be donated weekly - one on each side of high altar, and one on the floor in front of the low altar. The cost is currently \$55 per arrangement.

2. If there is a week where only one arrangement is donated, it will go in front of the low altar, and the white silk arrangements will be used on the high altar.

3. Kitty's will create a "seasonal mix" arrangement with colors to compliment the paraments, or to use fresh flowers they have readily available.

4. Please note that you are not able to choose a specific color palette for the high altar arrangements unless you are donating both – this ensures that the high altar arrangements match, and will look cohesive.

5. A single rose in a bud vase can be placed on the high altar. The cost is currently \$10. Limit one each week.

6. You may take your arrangement or bud vase with you AFTER the 11:00 am Festive service concludes.

### In the Fellowship Hall for CAYR service:

One floral arrangement traditional 3-point only can be donated weekly to be placed on the altar.
Kitty's will create a "seasonal mix" arrangement with colors to compliment the altar, or to use fresh flowers they have readily available.

3. A single rose in a bud vase can be placed on the altar. The cost is currently \$10. Limit one each week.4. You may take your arrangement or bud vase with you AFTER the 8:45 am CAYR service concludes.

- In order to get the special pricing that Kitty's extends to Asbury's members for altar arrangements, the type of flowers used in the arrangement are their choice carnations, chrysanthemums, gladiolus, etc. Flowers that are typically more expensive, such as roses, lilies, hydrangea, etc. are NOT available at the special price.
- You will be billed directly from Kitty's.
- If you do not wish to take the flowers you donated, we are happy to use them elsewhere! We will then make several smaller arrangements from the leftover flowers and the Visitation Team will give to our members during home, hospital or nursing home visits. If you have glass vases that you do not use and would like to donate for this cause, please place them in the donation box CURRENTLY LOCATED IN THE ADMIN HALLWAY CUBBIES.
