




## From the desk of PASTOR TOM PASMORE

It's been a very difficult spring at times. Stories on the news, like the shootings in the school in Nashville and the birthday party in Alabama, have rocked my little world with the realities of violent death that never seem to leave the headlines anymore. I know that we are not safe in the ways that we used to think we were. But just as I start to despair over a world that seems to be descending into anarchy and uncontrolled chaos, I think about the chaos that existed within the Biblical account of Jesus' life. Jesus was acutely aware that evil existed and often used thieves and robbers in his stories and parables. Jesus knew that safety and security were fleeting and transient things, as evidenced by the transformation of the crowds of people in Jerusalem during his last visit there. It only took one week for them to go from adoration to condemnation – from the triumphal entrance to a cross on a hill on Good Friday.

Father Richard Rohr reframes the paradox of Good Friday in this way. "Today the primary human problem is both revealed and resolved. It is indeed a 'good' Friday. What is revealed is our human inclination to kill others, in any multitude of ways, instead of dying to ourselves—to our own illusions, pretenses, narcissism, and self-defeating behaviors. Jesus dies 'for' us not in the sense of 'a substitute for us' but 'in solidarity with' the suffering of all humanity since the beginning of time! The first is merely a heavenly transaction of sorts; the second is a transformation of our very soul and the trajectory of history."

The message for hope for us is one that meets us at our lowest points. Beyond the transactional sacrifice that Christ made when he laid down his life, is the transformational reality that comes from the love and grace of God poured out at Calvary. If you are finding yourself in a place that is beyond awful—a place that feels like the valley of the shadow of death—then know that Jesus understands. He has been there too. And friends, we are all struggling right now. When a 30 year old former Marine retreats to a closet in his house every night with a fifth of vodka and his 9mm handgun, Jesus is there. When the economic systems of our day force working people out of their homes, and out of their cars, and onto the street, Jesus is there. When children are slaughtered in their schools—a place where they are supposed to be safe—Jesus is there. When dementia robs your mom of her ability to even know who you are, Jesus is there.

Jesus shows us that the Kingdom is built not upon the promise that we would never be hurt, diseased, or oppressed, but that in the midst of the worst that this world could throw at us, that the way of peace, the way of non-violence, the way of shalom is the way into the kingdom. Especially because it will cost us everything too, including our very lives.


We had a wonderful Easter celebration on April 9. A big thanks to all our musicians, singers, and those who made the worship services so celebratory that day.

The finance chart this month compares the 1st quarter of last year to this year. Overall, you can see we have very similar bottom line numbers. Our pledge contributions are down compared to last year. There may be several reasons for this: giving is not always done in similar patterns year to year, and our total pledges committed are down approximately 10%. Our Endowment Income is up \$15,000. In the Trustees Endowment Fund are a couple of accounts that benefit the operating budget. A few years ago, the church was blessed by a significant donation to this Endowment Fund which explains the increase. This will continue to benefit the budget year after year. This was the intent of the donor- to help provide for the church operating budget.

It is with a great sense of appreciation to let you know that the total amount received in the Easter offering was \$3,447.92! While there is no amount of money any of us can give that will ever "pay back" what the Lord did for us on the cross of Calvary, we know that giving in this manner will enable us to continue to reach out to our community and world.

Does God "need" our money? Well, when you consider that God owns the cattle on a thousand hills, which in essence means he owns it all and as a matter of fact has created everything containing any value... well... you get the point. God is not a "needy" God, however, we need to learn to be givers! When we give, we become just a bit more like the Father who "gave" His only begotten Son.

The Trustees continue the hard work of upgrading our facilities. This year's summer projects include more renovations, removing asbestos in the building, and upgrading flooring/ceiling/lighting. After ACDC closes for the summer, we will start the asbestos removal in classrooms #124 & #126. We will start this project on June 13. This renovation should not cause much disruption in the day to day operations, as it will be confined to that area in the Education Wing.

Starting July 17, we will begin the major upgrade to ceilings, lights and flooring of the Administrative hallways on the first floor. We will be closing this hallway, which includes access to the staff offices, Library, Fox Room and Mackey Room. This hallway will be closed for asbestos removal for approximately two weeks, and then will be under construction for several more weeks-similar to last year's renovation of the Memorial/Disciple Garden hallway. We want to make sure that you are aware that there will be disruptions to the summer activities here at Asbury. We can't wait for this project to be done so that we can see these upgrades in place.




#### ADULT SPIRITUAL FORMATION AND MEMBERSHIP

Dear faith family,

This month, we are exploring the Incarnational Stream of the Church—sacramental living. In our tradition, we have two sacraments—baptism and communion—tangible means of invisible grace. When we speak about "The Incarnation" we are talking about Jesus coming to earth and taking on human form, or being "embodied." So, the Incarnational Tradition is one of making present and visible the realm of the invisible Spirit. There are two prongs: to experience God as not only present in everyday life, but active, and to cooperate with the Spirit so that others can experience Christ through us. Richard Foster says it this way: "We are to be the dwelling place of the Holy Spirit, making the reality of God visible and manifest everywhere we go and in everything we do."



<sup>1</sup> How do we train for this? There are various ways, but one way is by participating in our monthly spiritual practice "Christ Through Me." The italicized portion below contains some ideas that we were offered at The Renovare Institute (adapted from Jan Johnson) in thinking about the Incarnational Stream:

A central question [is]: How would Jesus live **my** life today if he were me? <sup>2</sup> So if I have a website, I ask, How would Jesus design and operate my website if he lived my life? If I run a drycleaning business I ask, How would Jesus run my business if he were me? If I clean bathrooms at an airport, I ask, How would Jesus do this work and treat others if he were me?

This invites you to transfer your life situations and wonder how Jesus would live your life:

- in your living space: as a roommate or spouse or parent;
- on your job: how Jesus would design a class, organize workers, deal with clients who forget appointments;
- in your church: as a fellow leader, as someone who may serve those who frustrate you;
- in your neighborhood: why might it be a good thing to live next door to Jesus? How might Jesus be a neighbor to the guy on the other side of the wall of your condo? the next yard?
- while serving on a team with others in ministry?
   as a driver on the road? Or seated next to someone on a plane?

#### Exercise:

- 1. Each day, look over what you're going to be doing, who you're going to be interacting with, and what you're going to be planning. What settings and meetings will you be in? What possible delays and annoyances might you experience? (This might be the evening before or that morning or whenever it fits into the rhythm of your day.)
- 2. Prayerfully ask Jesus, How would you live my life today if you were me? Don't try to be too holy or heroic in this. Think of the heart of Christ: loving God, loving others. It's OK to be tentative: What would it look like to do this? How might Jesus speak the truth in love or go the extra mile? If nothing comes to you during that time of prayerful reflection, let it simmer and see what comes to you during the day.

- 3. Try to be gently conscious throughout the day that you are allowing Christ to do things through you.
- 4. Thank Jesus each day for guiding you carefully, shielding you through mishaps but also walking through some with you. Reflect on Jesus' life, perhaps read through the Gospel of Luke, notice what you admire about Jesus' life. Then tell him.

Join the discussion about the Incarnational Stream of the Church on Thursday May11th<sup>th</sup> at 7pm in the library. All are welcome to attend. If you have the book, read the chapter on the Incarnational Tradition. If you don't have the book, come anyway! Please let Kristen know you are coming.





#### ALTAR FLOWERS ARRANGEMENTS



We have had wonderful feedback about the altar flowers ministry! Altar flowers can be donated as a way to honor and remember loved ones, special anniversaries/events. We will note who you are honoring in the bulletin.

Following is our altar flowers program:

#### In the SANCTUARY for EMA and Festive services:

- 1.Up to 3 (traditional 3-point only) altar arrangements can be donated weekly one on each side of high altar, and one on the floor in front of the low altar. The cost is currently \$55 per arrangement.
- 2. If there is a week where only one arrangement is donated, it will go in front of the low altar, and the white silk arrangements will be used on the high altar.
- 3. Kitty's will create a "seasonal mix" arrangement with colors to compliment the paraments, or to use fresh flowers they have readily available.
- 4. Please note that you are not able to choose a specific color palette for the high altar arrangements unless you are donating both this ensures that the high altar arrangements match, and will look cohesive.
- 5. A single rose in a bud vase can be placed on the high altar. The cost is currently \$10. Limit one each week.
- 6. You may take your arrangement or bud vase with you AFTER the 11:00 am Festive service concludes.

#### In the Fellowship Hall for CAYR service:

- 1. One floral arrangement traditional 3-point only can be donated weekly to be placed on the altar.
- 2. Kitty's will create a "seasonal mix" arrangement with colors to compliment the altar, or to use fresh flowers they have readily available.
- 3. A single rose in a bud vase can be placed on the altar. The cost is currently \$10. Limit one each week.
- 4. You may take your arrangement or bud vase with you AFTER the 8:45 am CAYR service concludes.
- In order to get the special pricing that Kitty's extends to Asbury's members for altar arrangements, the type of flowers used in the arrangement are their choice carnations, chrysanthemums, gladiolus, etc. Flowers that are typically more expensive, such as roses, lilies, hydrangea, etc. are NOT available at the special price.
