What does it mean to be a disciple?

I have been wrestling with that question for a very long time. When I became a leader in the church 20 years ago, I thought I understood the answer to that question. When I completed seminary 15 years ago, I KNEW that I knew the answer to that question. As I study the United Methodist Church today, I'm not so sure that I know as much as I thought I did.

I used to think that a disciple was someone who went to church every Sunday and read the Bible frequently. While I acknowledge both of those things are important for us to continue to grow, I have begun to think that discipleship must be bigger than what can I do for my church. I think the better question is, what can I do to love God and neighbor better? Loving one another, and God first and foremost, is something that I can give my life to.


Loving God means that we are not only in the Word, but also living into the practices that Kristen has highlighted for us over the past few years. Prayer, study, fasting, *lectio divina*, meditation, silence, and so many others are what helps us connect to mystery that is God. These practices help us to reflect on where our pain is and where we could do better. Without them we are like a ship without a keel. We can turn the rudder as much as we want, but we are ultimately at the mercy of the winds of change and the gales of popular opinion. There is nothing deep enough in us to prevent us from heading off course.

Loving neighbor means living into acts of service and justice. We meet the needs of others as best we can in the moment. We feed the hungry. We give drink to the thirsty. We clothe the naked. We listen to the broken hearted. We love the outcast. We give healing to the wounded and diseased. We love everyone. This is how we connect with people and get to know others and build a relationship with them. It takes time and effort and persistence. It takes sacrifice. It takes lots and lots of love. Then we need to help by working to improve the world through working for justice. We need to cry out where injustice exists and seek to alter systems that do not help but hurt. We live into the three general rules. Do no harm. Do all the good you can. Stay in love with God.

This is what I now think discipleship means, and I pray that we can all live into it.

2 Corinthians 8:1-5 (Good News Translation)

1 Our friends, we want you to know what God's grace has accomplished in the churches in Macedonia. 2 They have been severely tested by the troubles they went through; but their joy was so great that they were extremely generous in their giving, even though they are very poor. 3 I can assure you that they gave as much as they could, and even more than they could. Of their own free will 4 they begged us and pleaded for


We look at giving as a chore or requirement or even a burden.



# ASBURY SERVICE PROJECT UPDATE



Ronald and his mother Carolyn share a home in rural Dorchester County. Diabetes has recently cost Ronald his leg, and with it his ability to enter and exit the house without assistance. That changed for Ronald on October 22, when your ASP team, in partnership with Chesapeake Housing Mission, built a much needed wheelchair ramp for Ronald.

Now in our 50<sup>th</sup> year, your ASP ministry is expanding to provide opportunities for those of you who would like to serve locally, and not go on a weeklong mission trip to participate. So far this expanded Asbury Service Project ministry has built three wheelchair ramps and participated in two workdays at the Zoo, improving animal habitats and the education building. Adults



and youth aged 13 or older are welcome to be a part of this exciting and rewarding ministry. We are currently in the process of outfitting a tool trailer generously donated by Buchannan Subaru, with the help of grants from Dewalt and Exelon.



Pancake breakfasts are back! Our first pancake breakfast of the season is scheduled for November 13, so come hungry for good food and fellowship to help support our primary fundraiser for our annual mission trip to Appalachia. As usual, pancakes, sausage, egg casserole and fruit cups will be available. 

#### ADULT SPIRITUAL FORMATION AND MEMBERSHIP Rev. Kristen Wall-Love, Director



Dear faith family,

November's spiritual practice has to do with God's Word and keeping the main thing the main thing. When I preached last month, I promised we would be spending some time with Jesus in the gospels (namely the gospel of John for now) in the forms of Bible Study—Thursday nights with Pastor Tom, and training to be in the scripture more in our everyday life.

So, we're going to call this practice "hanging out with Jesus in John's gospel." Not a short or catchy title, but accurate! The twist to this is that we're going to LISTEN to the scripture in place of silently reading. Most

folks were not literate in antiquity and the scripture was meant to be heard as it was proclaimed. Something different happens in our brains when we hear something as opposed to reading it silently. Then there is the proclamation part!

As you listen, notice what Jesus does, how he responds to people and situations, especially those who are hostile toward him. Also notice what Jesus doesn't do as he interacts with all kinds of folks and circumstances. The point is to spend time with Jesus, get to know him, and deepen your relationship with him. Journal about what you notice and ask questions.

There are several ways you can carry out this practice. The easiest way is to read scripture aloud instead of silently to yourself. Another option is to record yourself reading aloud and then listen to it. A

third way is to use an app or website that reads the scripture to you. I recommend the Dwell app, although there is a cost to this, you can choose the translation and voice, and music background (or none). There are other audio Bible apps available for free. If you would like something simpler, you can go to biblegateway.com and listen to audio Bible readings from there. Do a google search and see what will work for your practice. If you would like simple recordings emailed to you each week, I am recording the gospel of John by chapter, so let me know if you would like access to this option.

I encourage you to commit to listening to these chapters in John in whatever way is doable for you. The schedule at right is simply a suggestion. Do what you can, not what you can't. (Don't forget that Thanksgiving is in there!)

Here is the listening plan:
Nov. Week 1: Chapters 1-3
Nov. Week 2: Chapters 4-8
Nov. Week 3: Chapters 9-13
Nov. Week 4: Chapters 14-17
Nov. Week 5: Chapters 18-21

If you would like a check in, let me know by email or by marking the box about the spiritual practice of the month on the back of your connection card Sunday mornings. If you would like my recording of the scriptures for that week, please make a separate note about that.


#### <u>Proud to announce</u>

Once again Hands and Hearts Ending Homelessness (HHEH) will be opening on November 12 to offer homeless men in our community a safe, warm shelter and 3 meals a day. The location will be the same - Community Building of Park Seventh-Day Adventist Church on John Deere Drive. Asbury has committed to 2 weeks (January 22 – February 4). registration desk for an early shift (4:45 - 8:00 p.m.) and the evening shift (7:45 - 11:00 p.m.). HHEH has received a grant this year, and we are planning to hire a couple of men for overnight shifts, but we may still need a couple. #### STORIES FROM THE BASEMENT HELP AND OUTREACH POINT OF ENTRY, INC.

Food is key in all of our lives. Meal times are more than just a time to eat but, are often a time for families to connect or groups of people to socialize. Meals also provide a time to relax and think about the events that have past us prior to eating, or offer time to celebrate important events. Our clients are no different, although, they often come to us hungry and looking for a warm/cool place to eat in peace. In 2009 the agency began to provide coffee and cookies to the clients coming to us for services. Over the years, a volunteer felt we needed to provide a more substantial feeding program and Melody Fieo created the feeding outreach we have now. H.O.P.E., Inc. does our best to give the clients not only food but a comfortable place to enjoy some good home cooking. The kitchen staff works out of the church kitchen upstairs; sometimes coming in the day before to prep the meal. Every other Tuesday, several agencies provide an educational "Block Party" in the parking lot of the Wicomico Presbyterian Church drawing many people who are looking for assistance, education, and food. We feed between 30 and 60 people every day we are open.

We have a need for volunteers who can cook. H.O.P.E., Inc. provides the supplies and servers; we just need chefs. If you would be willing to volunteer one day a month, we can offer you a very rewarding opportunity to make a difference in the lives of those we serve.
