A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR



Friends, it is another amazing season of ministry here at Asbury UMC. Just look through the pages of this edition of the Asburian to see all the ministries that we are engaged in here in Salisbury. You are making a difference in the lives of people in this area and beyond. You are being the hands and feet of Christ.

As we enter the fourth quarter of 2022, It is finally seeming like we have turned a corner and things are getting back to normal as the pandemic recedes into the background. I want to encourage you to find one new thing in this season of new ministries. We need to get moving now that things are opening up. We need to continue to offer the love of Christ to the world around us and to one another.

At the same time, we need to find the quiet space within ourselves where God will meet us and journey with us. Kristen spoke of labyrinths in the month of September as one way to find our quiet center. There are so many others. Prayer and meditation are at the core of every faith tradition, and we need these times to help us process the business and activity going on all around us. The demands of our everyday lives point us toward what I consider a much better concept, which I am borrowing from music, we need action and contemplation to be in harmony. Not even or equal, but supporting one another as needed and creating a movement of the melody that is whole, sustainable, and complete. When we are in harmony, the fullness of life is abundant and real. Jesus needed action and contemplation, but in measures that kept his ministry, teaching, and life all in harmony. We are invited to do the same. We are invited to compose our lives in a way that harmony is the key. The balance of teeter-totter is easily upset when the storms of life start raging. But, some dissonance in the music often makes the composition richer and enhances the harmonies. We weather things better when we are in harmony. We live our lives more fully when they are in harmony.

So be a harmony so rich and wonderful that world can't help but join in. . . .

2022 GIVING CAMPAIGN: THE PRIVILEGE OF GIVING



2 Corinthians 8:1-5 (Good News Translation)

1 Our friends, we want you to know what God's grace has accomplished in the churches in Macedonia. 2 They have been severely tested by the troubles they went through; but their joy was so great that they were extremely generous in their giving, even though they are very poor. 3 I can assure you that they gave as much as they could, and even more than they could. Of their own free will 4 they begged us and pleaded for

the privilege of having a part in helping God's people in Judea. 5 It was more than we could have hoped for! First they gave themselves to the Lord; and then, by God's will they gave themselves to us as well.

We look at giving as a chore or requirement or even a burden. But what if we looked at giving as a privilege?? Paul tells the church in Corinth that the Macedonian church, which was poor in comparison, begged for the privilege of being part of fundraising effort to support the church in Jerusalem. Do we

desire an opportunity to be part of something bigger than ourselves? God has given us the breath of life, saved us from a life of sin, and called us to help build the Kingdom. Out of gratitude and thanksgiving, we have the privilege of being able to first give ourselves to God, and then being able to give to the mission of Christ in our world to make disciples and make a difference. On Sunday, November 13, Asbury can rejoice in the privilege of giving too. Join us for this very special day of worship!!

So, why AREN'T you a member of the Finance Committee?

The Finance Committee has often struggled to identify new members. During one recent year, several potential candidates were identified, but absolutely no one agreed to serve. To this day, the committee continues to operate with several empty positions.

What accounts for this resistance to serve? I am now in my sixth year of committee membership, the first three years, the usual term, as a regular member, and the COMMITTEE subsequent time as an ex officio member in my role as assistant treasurer. When I was initially approached as a potential committee member, I had several reservations. I was worried about time commitment. Having only recently retired and enjoying that freedom, I didn't want to be tied to another schedule, or to possible additional time-consuming requirements. I was worried that committee membership would require personal appeals to others for money (probably everyone's greatest reservation). Although I had some degree of financial sophistication as a result of personal and professional experiences, I was worried that my financial background and knowledge would be inadequate for the responsibilities of Finance Committee membership.

As it turned out, none of these concerns was justified. Time commitment is limited. We meet once a month, usually for about 90 minutes, and there are rarely, if ever, requirements for additional time. Members can now attend meetings by ZOOM, and some do. All of the members have busy lives, and we recognize and accept that members may be unable to attend every meeting. During my committee membership, I have never been asked personally to contact another individual with a request for a donation. Our financial campaigns have ordinarily been structured in such a way that such person-to-person solicitations are unnecessary. Although financial sophistication is welcomed, it is not really necessary, and very few of our members have been accountants, bankers, business people, and the like. Most of the "heavy lifting" of bookkeeping, reporting, and budget development is accomplished by church staff, so that the attribute required of committee members is a concern for the welfare and activities of the church, as reflected by financial decisions.

Following my initial reservations about committee membership, I will honestly say that I have enjoyed the experience. I even look forward to committee meetings, and this follows a lifetime of loathing almost all meetings of any kind. Membership has offered a much deeper appreciation of the variety of programs that Asbury supports, as well as the problems that we face. So, if you want to know what's going on, this is a good place to find out. A regret about attending a church as large and diverse as Asbury is that I don't know each of you as well as I would like. Committee membership has helped with that—people that I didn't know or barely knew have become friends as a result of our service together.

If you're asked to become a Finance Committee member, please agree. Even better, if you want to volunteer, please call Janice Ilczuk in the church office. This is God's work and His church needs you.

ASBURY SERVICE PROJECT UPDATE



Celebrating YEARS

Your Asbury Service Project mission team is up and running for our 50th year! In June, we hope to travel to Appalachia to help make homes warmer, safer, and drier for people living in poverty in our nation's coal belt. In the meantime, there is much to be done here at home.

This year marks a significant expansion of Asbury Service Project here at home! If you have ever wanted to help with a construction service project, but are unable to go on the trip to Appalachia in June, read on...

We have several building projects scheduled, notably wheelchair ramps with Chesapeake Housing Mission and improvements at the Salisbury Zoo, that are open to anyone age 13 or older who would like to come out and help. No

experience or tools necessary; we will train and equip you. So far this ASP Community ministry has constructed two wheelchair ramps: One for Mary, who suffers from a degenerative neurological disorder, and another for Nicholas, a 12-year-old battling muscular dystrophy. Our first Salisbury Zoo workday is scheduled for Saturday, October 8, which will involve constructing winter habitats for owls and other birds, and potentially improvements to the education building, depending on the number of volunteers. Anyone interested in participating in these local building service opportunities can contact Dave Harris at (443)235-2241 or Carton Bradshaw at (443) 235-2661.

All of this is being made possible by the generosity of our community. Buchanan Subaru is donating \$50 for every car they sell in September and October toward the purchase price of a new 6X12 enclosed trailer, which will be invaluable for storing and transporting the tools necessary to do the work of this ministry. In order to start purchasing those tools, we have funds donated in memory of Steve Dashiell, and we have received a grant from Exelon.

These donations are enough to kickstart the ministry; of course, its success will ultimately depend on the support of you, our ever loving congregation. So come out to the pancake breakfasts starting in November, and let us know if you would like to learn more about how you can be a part of Asbury Service Project's next 50 years. Most of all, pray for our church that we may be ever faithful to God's call.

October's Spiritual Practice is: Lament



*I consider the sermon that I preached on Jeremiah 8:18-9:1 September 18 to be a splendid introduction to our spiritual practice this month. There is an excerpt below, but if you would like to listen to the message in its entirety find that worship service on yYouTube.

The main point of spiritual practices is to deepen our relationship with God, and what better way to do that then to be completely vulnerable and honest with our Creator? Because, let's face it-God already knows. Our vulnerability and honesty doesn't give God information, but access to our hearts.

Kit Danely says this about communal lament (which can include groups lamenting together or individuals lamenting for a nation, people, or group):

Lament is an expression of sorrow. It is grief and recognition of death and loss. To lament together is to create the space—physically and emotionally—for wailing and praying and anger, for disbelief and all the other emotions that come We need to be reminded that our cries are not too much for God. He laments with us. In fact, He wants us to come to Him in our anger, in our fear, in our loneliness, in our hurt, and in our confusion.

Lament is a prayer searching for understanding and peace in the midst of suffering or disheartening circumstances. The Old Testament psalmists and prophets wove many such prayers of lament into their writings. The Bible teaches us how to lament. Biblical laments, when they begin, sound like a complaint. The complaints turn into requests ... [then statements of trust].

In the midst of the brokenness, there is sadness that the way things are now is not as God intended or desired. As with the biblical writers, it is possible for our laments to evolve into an expression of trust ... that God is setting things right, even though it often seems so slow. It is right for our laments to turn toward a reminder that God is in control and about the business of righting all things made wrong.

For some more context, here is an excerpt from the sermon "Healing Tears" on September 18:

...Some people just aren't cryers. This includes men and women. They rarely if ever cry—it's just how they're wired. ...Lamenting often involves tears, but not always. Lamenting can look like screaming or yelling, crying out with a loud voice. Lamenting can mean releasing pent up strong emotions of anger and grief. ...Maybe a punching bag would help release some strong emotions, or breaking plates in a safe place.

Lamenting can look like soulful singing or expression through music—the blues, for example. Lamenting can mean crying with the tears of our hearts. Whether we are using tissues or not, lament can take many forms.

What are you lamenting in your own life? What do you lament about your loved ones, church, community, nation, world? There are blue worksheets at the Welcome Centers on how to craft a personal lament

using the lament psalms as a guide. I encourage you to write out your personal and communal laments

this month. This idea and practice may be new to you and that's ok. Please sign up to receive informational and encouraging emails throughout the month about lament. Simply check the box on the back of your connection card that says "Monthly spiritual practice."

HELP AND OUTREACH POINT OF ENTRY, INC. STORIES FROM THE BASEMENT



Collaboration has always been at the root of our agency's outreach and we do what is needed to meet the needs of our clients. Every other Tuesday we now have an exciting event going on in the Wicomico Presbyterian Church parking lot; showing what working together can really accomplish. The wellness van from Tidal Health is present to offer walk in medical care, screenings, and vaccinations. Then there is

Rebirth, an agency focusing on reaching the Haitian community, offering food from the Food Bank, guidance in the legal system to obtain paperwork, translation services, and the Director brings energy and enthusiasm to community outreach. He has drawn in multiple agencies to help anyone who attends the event. Six agencies were represented last week and each week a new one appears. It is so exciting! Both programs run from 10 am until 12 noon. Just as Rebirth is packing up their canopies and talking with people still drifting through, the shower trailer arrives. Beyond our Walls is a nonprofit agency that brings hot showers, toiletries, underwear, clean towels, and lots of love. Their goal is to restore hope and dignity with a hot shower and a smile.

The parking lot is chaotic and the number of clients who pass through the office or ask for a meal can be a bit overwhelming to our staff. Last Tuesday we served 54 different clients in the office and provided 68 meals to the hungry. It's such a blessing to be able to feel God's love flow from what is done here at H.O.P.E., Inc. with our partners.
