Friends, the start of a new year of ministry is right around the corner. I am so excited to be here at Asbury right now. What has really given me joy lately is the work that I am a part of with the Catalyst Initiative. I thought that I would take a little time to fill you all in on this incredible opportunity.

The goal of the Catalyst Initiative to change us for the better. The Catalyst Initiative provides a 12-month congregational cohort process of discovery, exploration, and renewal. It will empower Asbury to initiate a Spirit-led

vision and understanding of our community; ignite our faith into action; and invigorate us to claim God's call to empower and enliven our community. We need to be a people who are bold enough to be willing to risk—their comfort, their time, their willingness to be right, and their certainty. It's time that we engaged with God deeply and honestly about what we are willing to do to spread the Gospel.

Finally, I want to close with this prayer for our community of faith here at Asbury:

Embolden us to be vulnerable and authentic seekers of your wisdom and your will. We claim this as a sacred and brave space for learning, for questioning, for building, and for growth; and ask your blessing on all we think, do, and become. Teach us to dare. Teach us to remember. Teach us to love. So that when we stumble or doubt, we choose wisely, opt for enthusiasm, and embrace the promise you've placed in our hearts. Make us catalysts of hope and thriving in the church and the world.



#### THE ARRIVAL OF THE AFGHAN FAMILY



In March the Leadership team of Asbury voted to investigate and then sponsor an Afghan Refugee family. The resettlement of Afghan families is called 90 Days to Independence. Partnering with Church World Service, a subcontractor of the US State Department, a plan was developed and the wheels put in motion. If we look on the wall in Fellowship Hall, 2 of the 5 habits of Fruitful Congregations include Radical Hospitality and Extravagant Generosity.

On August 8, an Asbury welcoming committee gathered up the Afghan family at the airport and transported them to their new home in Salisbury. The family includes a father, mother, three children ages 11, 9, and 2 plus a brother of the Mom. We are blessed for the father's good English language skills which makes communications so much easier. He was closely involved with US military forces. The two older children and the wife also can speak some English.

They have been incredulous, joyful, overwhelmed and grateful for the Radical Hospitality from Asbury, the Delmarva Muslim Community, Salisbury University, and the many other community partners and individuals who have worked since March to prepare for their arrival. Committees for housing, education, jobs and finance, medical, cultural adjustment, transportation, and legal affairs have busied themselves organizing different aspects to make them welcome and smooth their placement and adjustment. Many thanks are due to so many people who have pitched in to get the house ready, from polishing up the exterior and readying the yard, to the furniture, small repairs, and providing bicycles for the adults and children who love to ride in their neighborhood. Computers, phones, food, clothing, toys, games, guitars, books and so many other items too numerous to mention have been donated. Extravagant generosity also involves giving of peoples' time and energy to engage the family. What we have received from the family is also an example of Radical Hospitality as they always want visitors to have tea or coffee. That hospitality is very important in the Afghan culture.

Kudos to the extended medical/dental community for stepping up and expediting exams and treatment upon their arrival. Initially, the father will be working at SU and hopefully the uncle. The children are registered to attend Pinehurst Elementary School and the adults will also be taking English classes at SU. All of this has been accomplished in just two weeks. More remains to smooth their transition and to achieve the goal of the State Department and Church World Service which is called 90 Days to Independence. Let us thank God for all his blessings on this family and on the Salisbury community whose Radical Hospitality and Generosity are working as His hands and feet!

# September's Spiritual Practice is: Labyrinth

Praying with a labyrinth is a form of walking meditation, a physical expression of the interior journey towards Christ that characterizes all Christian meditation. Like a pilgrimage, forms of walking meditation evoke our earthly journey towards heaven while simultaneously giving us time and space to listen and respond to the Lord.

The earliest examples of labyrinths go back nearly 5,000 years, but the use of labyrinths in Christian prayer emerged during the Middle Ages. The most famous example of a Christian labyrinth intended for prayer is the stone labyrinth inlaid on the floor of the Chartres Cathedral in France. However, you can find prayer labyrinths in most areas of the country, from abbeys and monasteries to the campuses of parishes and colleges.



Sometimes the words "labyrinth" and "maze" are confused. While both refer to circling patterns, the two are totally different. A maze is a puzzle and thus designed to confuse. A labyrinth is a single path which leads the walker to the center and back out. In an open, receptive frame of mind, the walker simply follows the path in and the out and experiences a deep, refreshing form of meditation. There are many ways to describe a labyrinth. It is a path of prayer, a walking meditation, a crucible of change, a watering hole for the spirit and a mirror of the soul.

Where we pray affects how we pray. Most of the time, we seek to pray in places of quiet and stillness. At other times, taking a walk or simply being outside helps us pray. Although we can embark on a walking meditation nearly anywhere, the predictable and concentrated route of a labyrinth frees us from the inevitable distractions that come with being out on a walk (like recalling directions or wondering when to turn back). If being outdoors makes you feel closer to God or if pilgrimage has been influential in your spiritual life, then praying with a labyrinth might be a helpful practice.



There are two-sided informational handouts at the Welcome Centers (including a finger labyrinth if you cannot get to or would have trouble walking a physical labyrinth). Visit the labyrinths available in the Salisbury Area: one is at St. Alban's Episcopal Church 302 St. Alban's Drive in Salisbury and the other is recently installed to the Riverwalk by the Rotary Club and is located on the northeast side of the South Division Street bridge, across from the library. There is also one near-by in Ocean Pines at 11227 Racetrack Road, Berlin. Let Kristen know if you have questions. 
