PASTOR'S MESSAGE



Hebrews 13:2 Don't neglect to open up your homes to guests, because by doing this some have been hosts to angels without knowing it.

Christian Hospitality

I recently watched a funny, but telling, standup comedy act where the comedian contrasts what it was like when someone knocked on our front door 50 years ago. to someone knocking on our front door today. Fifty years ago, the whole family jumped up with excitement to have a visitor, the special guest cake was brought to the dining room in order to be shared with whoever it could be, the TV and radio with each of us, calls us to focus first and were shut off, and the whole house was already clean in anticipation of that unannounced guest. It was just expected that someone might drop by every day of the week. But today, if someone knocks at the door we might say, "What was that sound? Be quiet!" "Maybe they'll go away if they don't know we're home. Is the car in the garage or in the driveway?" "It's probably one of those door-to-door salesmen." Though this is exaggerated, this contrast may put into context our call to be people of hospitality in the world in which we live.

Christian hospitality is more than having a Bundt cake sitting on the kitchen love that Christ first offered us. counter; it is more about inviting people to be in a relationship with us and our families. It is about inviting people of all walks of life to feel at home in a nonjudgmental place. This is why we see Jesus eating with tax collectors, healing

lepers, proclaiming good news for the poor, sharing the love of God with a Samaritan woman, and turning water into wine at a wedding feast. Wherever Jesus went, people were most important. Hospitality amongst us may have declined over the years. It may have been replaced by the desire for success, materialism, individualism, political and social divides. But Jesus, in the very relationship He has foremost on our relationships with others. The greatest commandments of Jesus are to love God and love our neighbor: relationships are most important to him.

So might we be intentional in building relationships in our community? How many of us know our neighbors, have invited them over for dinner, or have shared the joy of our children with them? We have neighbors in our nursing homes who are alone and the smile of a child might be just what they need. Maybe it is time to open our homes, our churches, and our little corners of the world in order to welcome people to experience the rich

A new chapter is about to begin in the history of the Music Ministries at Asbury Church. The church will experience the directorship of Michael Stefanek, starting May 2, 2016. Consequently, it might be well to recapture the history of previous stewards of this ministry.

Early on, Clara Walton directed the music for the congregation up until 1907. Mrs. Martindale, wife of Rev. Thomas E. Martindale, a pastor at Asbury, carried on the music duties until 1915. Nina Veale served as director from 1915 to 1928. Frances Hopkins, a well-known pianist, carried the torch from about 1928 to 1935. Then, Mrs. Hildred Moller, a known community musician, served from 1935 to 1941.

Mrs. Arla Hayman, wife of Graham Hayman, took the position of director in 1942 until 1949. In later years, her husband, Graham, was a devoted member of the Chancel Choir.

One of the reasons for my involvement in this history narrative was my participation as a Youth Choir member. David Kidder was appointed the Director of Religious Education and Director of Music in 1949. My sister and I took part in several musical programs under his direction in the early 1950s. The Youth Choir rehearsals were held in a concrete-sided building behind the Fellowship Hall while directed by Joseph Armbrust and Joseph Privette. During Mr. Privette's tenure from 1956 to 1965, Asbury built a new facility, with Mr. Privette instrumental in acquiring a 55 rank/3000 pipe organ for the production of service music in the large, reverberant Nave.

Homer Jackson (1963-1973) and William Evans (1973-1974) carried on the direction of the music program at Asbury. Mr. Jackson, I hear, was quite a musician, enjoying a career as a jazz pianist after leaving Asbury. Gordon Turk, a young talented musician, directed choirs for one year before going on to play the organ at the Ocean Grove seaside in New Jersey (where he still is performing).

Next we come to the service of Taylor Harvey, for 28 years (1975 to 2003) the steward of the Music Ministries at Asbury. Taylor did much to offer an excellent music program in all areas, as well as seeing to minor repairs to the organ. Following his tenure, Robert Young came onboard continuing the development and expansion of the music department. Robert also headed up a campaign with committee members to completely restore the Casavant organ, after 50 years of usage at Asbury.

Praise also goes to two talented ladies who served as interim directors on the music program: Lee Bicknell and Barbara Hall, both having outstanding music credentials, led the choirs on their spiritual journeys.

It has been an honor to have been associated with the ever-changing music program at Asbury. This inspirational journey of 50 plus years was due to the leadership of a variety of talented directors.

All Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness, so that the servant of God may be thoroughly equipped for every good work.

Engaging Young People with the Bible

Recent studies have found that more than 70% of young people never read their Bibles. Adrian Bienkinsop says that in analyzing these studies, it is obvious that youth doubt the authenticity and relevance of the Bible. They struggle with its language, strange rituals, and many laws. They also find a hard time reconciling the violence in the Bible. No longer does the Bible hold the authority it once did and young people tend to be especially skeptical.

Young people are still asking the big questions like "Why am I here?" and "Why do I matter?" and I believe that the overall story of the Bible speaks profoundly of our purpose and why we are here. The problem is that we oftentimes get caught up in the details of a text that is more than 2,000 years old, and written by people with an entirely different understanding of life, and an entirely different worldview. I believe the key for young people to finding meaning in scripture is for them to be able to engage, argue, and struggle with the text. They must also have the opportunity to contemporarily apply the Bible to their everyday experiences.

We, as parents, teachers, and leaders, are responsible for encouraging young people to study the Bible in a way that sparks their imagination. Might they argue with Paul when he talks about women from the perspective of a patriarchal society? Might young people debate about the violence and wars of the Old Testament? Might they consider the difference in how Jesus talked about the poor and how our society today talks about the poor? When young people have the opportunity to wrestle with such questions, debate, engage, and imaginatively apply what they're exploring, they can find out for themselves that the Bible has so much to offer as it speaks to one's innermost soul.

If a young person is struggling with their looks, the Bible speaks powerfully that our identity is in Christ and not based on how the world sees us. If we've made a life-changing mistake, the Bible speaks of grace and forgiveness. If someone is looking for their purpose, scripture informs us that no matter who we are, we have God-given gifts that we can use to make the world a better place. Over and over again, the Bible answers our biggest questions and empowers us to live together as the beloved people of God.

One of the most misunderstood concepts in the UMC is apportionments. Once I began my service on the Salisbury District Apportionment Review team, I gained a deeper understanding of the apportionment process.

Apportionments are a way that the United Methodist Church meets its unique characteristic of being Connectional. As a group, we are able to support many varied ministries. The four main areas of ministry supported by apportioned funds are: Connectional Ministries, Healthy Church Ministries, Administrative Ministries, and Clergy Support.

In the Peninsula-Delaware Conference, the annual calculation is no longer based on membership. For the last several years, apportionments are calculated using the church's actual general operating expenses for the previous three years. Missions and capital expenditures are not included in the calculation.

Just as most churches have worked to reduce expenses, the Pen-Del Conference has worked diligently to reduce the expenses related to Administrative Ministries. Connectional Ministries and Healthy Church Ministries receive just over 65% of the apportioned funds.

Asbury UMC has a proud tradition of paying 100% of their apportionments. Asbury's 2015 apportionments were \$92,441, and 2016 apportionments are \$91,495.

"Together, through our connected congregations, we accomplish what no single church, district or annual conference ever could hope to do alone. In this way, each individual, each family, each congregation gives a fair share for the church's work. We combine our prayers, presence, gifts, witness and service to make a significant difference in the lives of God's people" (umc.org).

Quilting Ministry

Ouilting--the stitching together of layers of padding and fabric-- may date as far back as ancient Egypt.

The art of quilting, once an important part of women's and young girl's lives, has evolved into a

The art of quilting, once an important part of women's and young girl's lives, has evolved into a popular hobby for women who have a passion for fabric and sewing. Through Asbury's active Quilting Ministry, this passion is lovingly stitched together with a spiritual need to serve others.

The Quilting Ministry got its start in 2007 when decorative quilts and wall hangings were crafted as part of the *Christmas at Asbury* celebration. The following year, under the coordination of Patty Clendenen, the making of quilts evolved into a creative, multi-faceted ministry.

Each June, colorful patchwork quilts, sometimes as many as 20, are sent along with Asbury's Appalachia Service Project (ASP) teams. Each team's family receives the hand-crafted gift at the completion of the work week. In addition, smaller quilts are given to children in need within the ASP community being served. In Salisbury, quilts are also presented to new home owners each time a Habitat for Humanity house is completed. Receiving a lovingly-stitched quilt is surely a God-moment for both the recipients and the donors.

The Quilting Ministry has even branched out and is now creating some of the church banners which hang in the Sanctuary, as well as making a few of Pastor Benita's clerical stoles.

Patty says what she loves best about the Quilting Ministry is being a part of a team, especially since each quilt can be worked on by several people. Some quilters lay out squares and begin sewing them into rows; others sew the rows together. The team then works in tandem to lay out and pin the nearly-finished result prior to the final step of machine quilting.

You'll find the faithful quilters hard at their work every Tuesday from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. in their well-equipped workroom on the 2nd floor of the Educational Wing. Besides Patty, other Asbury members who participate regularly are Sandy Baldridge, Emily Saulsbury, Ellen Smith, and




God's Kitchen

Asbury Service Project (ASP)

Jerry is a retired pastor living in our local community. His life's journey has seen him married to the love of his life for 58 years, raising seven children and serving others throughout his ministry. He has always had a heart for youth, serving as a scout master and working with the youth in his congregations over the course of his many years in ministry.

Now in his seventh decade and widowed, Jerry's physical health has declined, but his spirit is as bright and strong as ever. He loves the Lord, loves people and loves to spend time with anyone who will talk to him.

In recent years, a series of heart attacks and strokes, along with diabetes and partial blindness, have severely limited Jerry's ability to leave his home. Traversing the steps, even with the aid of his son who lives with him, is quite hazardous.

Your Asbury Service Project team was recently blessed with the opportunity to serve this servant. Working through Chesapeake Housing Mission, which identifies the needy and provides the materials, ASP builds wheelchair ramps for Jerry and others in our community who have similar needs. These projects provide us with safety and skill training, and give us the opportunity to meet some awesome folks.

At the end of the day, when it was time to dedicate Jerry's new ramp, he told us how impressed he had been watching us throughout the day. He said that he had been blessed to witness our camaraderie and joy, and then he led the prayer. Indeed, we were blessed.

A footnote to the story: Jerry's first pastoral appointment was to a church near Bluefield, WV, in Mercer County. This years' trip to Appalachia will take our group to Wyoming County, which is adjacent to Mercer. Small world.

All of our fundraising activities are completed for the year; thank you for your generous support of our pancake breakfasts and taco & baked potato dinners. We have completed three wheelchair ramp builds, including Jerry's, and we have one more to go on May 14.

Thank you, fellow Asburians, for your prayers, your presence and your financial support of this ministry. It could not happen without you.
